QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS to all good Catholics who desire the welfare and success of this Mission, HUNSTANTONON-SEA, NORFOLK.

Q. Who wished the Mission started?

A. 1. The late Bishop of Northampton.

- 2. The Protestant landlord of all Hunstanton; Catholic visitors who could not go there without missing Mass it being impossible to get to Lynn (16 miles) on Sunday for Mass, there being no trains.
- 3. Those who were recommended by doctors to come to the place for their health.
- The tradesmen, hotel keepers, and lodging houses, who lost many because there was no Catholic Church.
- A few poor Catholics living in the district, without Mass or Sacraments, and miles from a priest if they were dying.
- Q. What has happened since it was founded in November, 1903?
- A. A Presbytery has been built and Sacristies for a future Church, and both have been paid for, the ground on which they stand being the gift of the Protestant landlord, Mr. Le Strange of Hunstanton Hall.
- Q. Has any progress been made, any converts, any increase in the Congregation to show it was wanted?
- A. Yes; 12 converts, and instead of 8 or 10 at Mass in winter there is an average of 40.
- Q. Are there many summer visitors to use it?
- A. Yes; more than the Sacristy can hold sometimes, in spite of two Masses on Sunday.

- Q. Does the Diocese keep the priest and pay for the expenses of the Mission?
- A. Not a penny has ever been given by the Diocese, which is too poor to do so.
- Q. Who paid for the buildings?
- A. The priest begged it, and the buildings were paid for principally by one generous benefactress now dead, (R.I.P.) and a few others.
- Q. Can I see a picture post-card of the buildings?
- A. Certainly; they are sent to the smallest benefactor.
- Q. How has the priest lived if he has only a few poor people and has no help from the Diocese?
- A. By the visitors offerings in summer, and a mere pittance in winter in the shape of offertories which do not come to 10/- a week, and have been lately as little as 3/3½ all day Sunday, and by help from a few personal friends occasionally.
- Q. Have you no Endowment, then?
- A. No; and that is why I am asking for help to found an Endowment Fund to help me to live and keep the Mission for quite nine months of the year.
- Q. When are you going to build the proper Church, as the Sacristy is not big enough in summer for your congregation?
- A. Not till the Mission is endowed and at least two-thirds of the funds are actually in hand for the purpose.
- Q. Are you authorized to appeal to the Catholic world by proper authority?
- A. I am; by our Vicar-Capitular ruling the Diocese till the new Bishop of Northampton is appointed by Rome.

- Q. Who are the trustees of the Fund? For I must do my best to help a Mission so needed, and so deserving of being helped in its struggle for existence.
